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KARLOVY VARY FESTIVAL TO HONOR BOLESLAV POLÍVKA

At the festival's 56th edition, the KVIFF President's Award for outstanding figures in Czech cinema will go to actor, playwright, screenwriter, and director BOLESLAV POLÍVKA.

Bolek Polívka first came to audiences' attention as a distinctive and inimitable theater actor and co-founder of Brno's legendary Goose on a String theater. The plays that he directed and starred in (Am and Ea, Pezza versus Čorba, Pépe, The Castaway, The Final Trap, The Jester and the Queen) were inspired by cabaret clownery, commedia dell'arte, and slapstick cinema, although their distinctive style consciously transcended genre boundaries. The unique and original nature of these performances earned Polívka recognition at home and abroad and led to numerous collaborative efforts with leading international theater ensembles. In 1993, he founded the Bolek Polívka Theatre, and as an actor he continues to perform with a number of theaters outside Brno.

For more than two decades, Bolek Polívka has left a similarly distinctive mark on domestic cinema as well. His first larger role was as Mageri in the

musical *Ballad for a Bandit* (1978, dir. V. Sís). This was followed by a series of important collaborations with director Věra Chytilová, beginning with *Calamity* (1981) and eventually expanding to include five films. Even years later, *The Inheritance or Fuckoffguysgoodday* (1992) – a tragicomic parable of life in early post-communist Czech society – shows how precisely the creative tandem of Polívka-Chytilová (they both co-wrote the screenplay) was capable of identifying the new era's social shifts. Other joint projects include a film adaptation



of Polívka's play *The Jester and the Queen* (1987), another co-written film, *Expulsion from Paradise* (2001), and *Pleasant Memories* (2006).

Polívka's extensive filmography clearly reflects his ability to work across genres. Although audiences tend to see him as a comic actor thanks to his roles in popular comedies such as *Cosy Dens* (1999), *I'm All Good* (2008), or *Men in Hope* (2011), he has earned respect and recognition outside this genre as well. For instance, his portrayal of a priest in Vladimír Michálek's *Forgotten Light* (1996) earned him a Czech Lion for best actor and another award in the same category at the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival. He later also took home a Czech Lion for best actor for *Divided We Fall* (dir. Jan Hřebejk, 2000), which was nominated for an Oscar for best foreign film. Another seven nominations for the annual Czech Lion awards document the diverse range of genres Polívka is capable of: Tomáš Vorel's bitter *Out of the City* (2000), Jan Hřebejk's humorous portrait of the communist era *Pupendo* (2003), Bohdan Sláma's rawly poetic *Something Like Happiness* (2005), Jiří Vejdělek's *Roming (*2007), in which Polívka formed one half of a charmingly incongruous duo with Marián Labuda, Alice Nellis's fantasy film *Angels* (2014), Slávek Horák's remarkable debut *Home Care* (2015), and Jiří Strach's fairy tale *Angle of the Lord 2* (2016).

Polívka has worked with many other directors on a number of films, including Juraj Jakubisko (*Sitting on a Branch, Enjoying Myself,* 1989; *Bathory,* 2008), the previously mentioned Tomáš Vorel (*To the Woods,* 2012; *The Way Home,* 2021), and F. A. Brabec (*Wild Flowers,* 2000; *The Magical Duvet,* 2011; and *Gump: The Dog That Taught People to Live,* 2021).

Bolek Polívka also frequently appears on Czech television screens, where he hosts the longrunning shows *Manéž* and *Bolkoviny* and has also appeared in a number of television series (*Cases of the 1st Department*).

As an homage to Bolek Polívka, Karlovy Vary festival will screen the film Forgotten Light.



KARLOVY VARY FESTIVAL TO PRESENT PREMIERE OF DIGITALLY RESTORED ADAPTION OF MILAN KUNDERA'S THE JOKE

At its 56th edition, the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival continues its longrunning tradition of premiering digitally restored versions of classic Czech films. This year, the festival will be showing another important example of the Czechoslovak New Wave, director Jaromil Jireš's 1968 adaptation of Milan Kundera's novel *The Joke*.

A masterful film adaptation of a famous novel, *The Joke* is the darkly grotesque story of how, in an atmosphere of absolute intolerance, spying, and denunciations, an innocent student prank can fundamentally ruin a life.

The main protagonist, Ludvík Jahn, returns to his hometown after many years away in order to meet the radio journalist Helena Zemánková. His main motivation for the meeting, however, is the fact she is married to his former classmate and best friend, who literally ruined Ludvík's life and future through an innocent prank. The bitter Ludvík plans to use Helena for his belated revenge, which in the end proves a failure and leaves him feeling even more



pathetic, embarrassed, and alone than when his friends expelled him from university at a party meeting.

Milan Kundera published his novel in 1967 and worked closely with director Jaromil Jireš on writing its screen adaptation. The film, which premiered in early 1969, was awarded the Silver Siren at a screening of Czech and Slovak films in Sorrento, Italy, and also took home an award from the 17th San Sebastián International Film Festival. With the onset of Normalization, it was locked away and was not shown at more international film festivals until after 1989.

The Joke is a cinematically unostentatious reinterpretation of the basic themes found in Kundera's novel. It paints a meticulous, almost harrowing picture of how the communist terror of the 1950s was able to upend the lives of ordinary people and distort the perception of ethical values.

The film's digital restoration was organized by the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival in collaboration with the National Film Archive and the State Fund for Cinema. The digital restoration process was performed in 2022 at UPP and Soundsquare using original sound and film negatives stored at the National Film Archive. *The Joke* is the twenty-third film whose restoration was made possible thanks to a donation from Milada and Eduard Kučera.

The Karlovy Vary festival has long supported the screening of digitally restored copies of important works of domestic and international cinema. The festival's tradition of digitally restoring Czech films began with *Marketa Lazarová* in 2011 and since then has continued with other works of Czech cinema. The 55th KVIFF also hosted a large retrospective of films restored by The Film Foundation, established by the renowned director Martin Scorsese with the goal of preserving and protecting examples of world cinema.



KARLOVY VARY INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL PRESENTS KVIFF TALENTS. THE PROGRAM SUPPORTS THE DEVELOPMENT OF ORIGINAL AUDIOVISUAL PROJECTS

The organizers of the Karlovy Vary IFF are expanding the festival's portfolio of activities aimed at systematically supporting filmmakers. For many years, these activities, which have included workshops and presentations of projects in the developmental stage, were held as part of the festival's KVIFF Eastern Promises program.



This year, the festival presents the pilot year of a new project, KVIFF Talents. The objective of this yearround program is to identify talented filmmakers and to support the creation of creative audiovisual projects with international ambitions possessing a high level of originality. As part of the program, the selected filmmakers will be provided financing for development, mentoring from experts, and the chance to

present their projects to potential producers, partners, and investors at the festival in Karlovy Vary. Applications for this year will be received until 22 May.

"Promoting new talents has always been a central part of the festival's activities. With KVIFF Talents, we are moving these activities onto a new level. We are convinced that the program will be another piece of the puzzle promoting greater originality, creative boldness, and international ambitions by filmmakers from our region," says KVIFF's executive director Kryštof Mucha.

KVIFF Talents is divided into two sections, held in parallel. The "Creative Pool" focuses on the search for creative ideas for audiovisual works of any format or genre – it could be a short film, a web series, a podcast, a music video, or a video game. The goal of the "Feature Pool," meanwhile, is to support ideas for original live-action films that have the potential to be made quickly with a budget under five million Czech crowns. The project's pilot phase is open to submissions from the Czech Republic and Slovakia. In the future, there is a chance that the project will be expanded to include all of Central and Eastern Europe.

"A key feature of KVIFF Talents is that it takes an individualized approach. We realize that every project has different needs during the delicate development stage, and so we are planning to provide filmmakers with customized support," adds Mucha. In the current call for submissions, which is open until 22 May, filmmakers can submit their projects to two programs: the Creative Pool and the Feature Pool. In early June, each program will select three filmmakers to be this year's KVIFF Talents. Over the course of the Karlovy Vary film festival,



the program will organize presentations with the goal of connecting the filmmakers with potential producers, partners, and investors. This step marks the beginning of long-term collaboration aimed at financing the project's development, providing help with financing, or offering mentoring during the development, production, and distribution stages. KARLOVY VARY WILL HOST THE WORKS-IN-PROGRESS PROGRAM OF THE ODESA FILM FESTIVAL

The Karlovy Vary festival will support Ukrainian filmmakers and the country's film industry through a unique collaborative project with the Odesa International Film Festival (OIFF).

The unprecedented military assault on Ukraine has been accompanied by fundamental limitations to the country's cultural life. The Karlovy Vary festival expresses its full support for Ukrainian filmmakers and festival organizers, and will thus host the Works-in-Progress program of the 13th Odesa International Film Festival, which cannot be held there because of the war. In Karlovy Vary, the program will be known as OIFF WIP Selection.

"We are convinced that broad solidarity with war-afflicted Ukraine must also include support for the country's cultural life, which at this moment has come almost to a halt. As a film festival, we have thus tried to find ways of supporting Ukrainian cinema, and we are glad that we have managed to work with the Odesa film festival to find a meaningful form of cooperation," says Hugo Rosák, head of KVIFF's Industry Department.



"The current conditions of the war in which the Ukrainians find themselves have a direct impact on the film industry. Therefore, we were offered to hold the industrial part of the Odesa International Film Festival as part of the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival. We are extremely grateful to our colleagues for this opportunity. For the opportunity to show Ukrainian cinema, Ukrainian talent and culture to the world", – Anna Machuh, General Director of OIFF said. Works in progress at the Odesa International Film Festival is a presentation of the completed feature-length films by their producers and directors to be distributed in 2022-2023. The main goal of the Work in progress presentation is to promote Ukrainian films in the world and local markets and to attract the attention of international distributors and also to find the partners for future projects. The selection committee of the OIFF selects 12 feature film projects in the final stage of shooting or in post-production produced in Ukraine or in co-production with Ukraine. Projects should meet the international quality standards to be demonstrated in frames of the Works in progress presentation
